The Nature Conservancy Looks to Purchase Dams; Many Unknowns Remain for Norridgewock

Last month, news formally broke that Brookfield Renewable, the owner of four dams on the lower Kennebec River, had entered into a purchase and sale agreement with The Nature Conservancy (TNC). TNC's intent has been clear: they will seek to have the dams decommissioned and removed to help restore the river's natural flow and improve fish passage for migratory species. While the environmental benefits are a key focus, there are also significant economic considerations. Chief among them is the potential impact on SAPPI's Somerset Mill in Skowhegan, which relies on water flow from the Shawmut Dam to support its operations. TNC has stated that it intends to ensure the mill continues to have an adequate water supply throughout and after the transition.

The sale process is expected to take at least one year, during which time Brookfield will continue to operate the dams as usual. Each river community faces unique circumstances, and local officials have appreciated that TNC has already begun outreach to discuss potential concerns.

In a recent meeting with TNC representatives, the Town Manager outlined a few initial requests for information. While the process is still in its early stages, there is shared understanding that such a significant change in river management will have environmental, economic, and community-level implications. Among the requests made:

- That visual renderings be provided to illustrate what the Kennebec River might look like in Norridgewock if the Weston Dam in Skowhegan were removed;
- That clarification be provided on whether the shoreland zone and floodplain boundaries would change as a result; and
- That officials identify who would be responsible for any necessary re-mapping or related costs.

These are early but important questions for the community as the conservation continues. Residents are encouraged to stay informed as new information becomes available. The Nature Conservancy has pledged to hold local meetings and to include public input as part of the process. When those meetings are scheduled, the Town will ensure public notice is posted and residents have an opportunity to participate in shaping the river's future. ♦

Select Board Approves the Formation of a Library Building Committee

The Norridgewock Select Board has authorized the creation of a new Library Building Committee to guide planning and development for a potential new public library on Mercer Road. The committee, approved at the September 17 meeting, will explore the feasibility of developing the Mercer Road lot for a new library and, if deemed viable, will oversee the project's design, budgeting, and community engagement. The initiative aims to ensure that the proposed facility meets the community's evolving needs while remaining fiscally responsible and visually appealing.

The Select Board appointed Jean Lancaster, Roger Collard, Richard LaBelle, Lindsey Lynch, Jeffrey Jones, Sheila Leavitt, and Deanna Meservie to serve on the committee. Mrs. Lancaster will chair this committee, as she is also the Chair of the Library Board of Trustees. The group will act as a liaison between the Select Board, Library Trustees, and the broader community, providing regular updates and gathering public input throughout the process.

According to the approved committee description, early work will focus on assessing community needs and reviewing conceptual designs. A public input phase is expected to begin in October, followed by design development through late 2025 and early 2026. The committee's goal is to present a full proposal, including cost estimates, design plans, and potential funding sources, to the Select Board and voters at the March 2026 Town Meeting.

If approved by voters, the new library would replace the existing 30-by-60-foot facility with a modern, accessible building. Very preliminary designs call for dedicated spaces for children and families, a large community room, expanded book collections, technology stations, and quiet reading areas. Outdoor amenities could include greenspace, seating, and a story walk area to encourage year-round community use.

The Library Building Committee's work marks a major step toward reimagining Norridgewock's public library for the next generation—ensuring that the facility continues to serve as a hub for learning, creativity, and community connection for years to come.

He grew arms long enough to stretch out of the children's area and into other parts of the library.

In other summer news, the library's Summer Reading Squad reading challenge had a 95 percent increase in the number of children receiving awards. We received an honorable mention from Beanstack for our reading challenge participation within our population category.

School-year programs started up in September with Tadpole Storytime participants making handprint mice and apple stamp art. Roads and Responsibilities



Not all roads in Maine are the same, and not all are maintained by the same people. Across the state, and right here in Norridgewock, roads fall into three general categories: State, Town, and Private. Each carries different responsibilities for construction, repair, and winter maintenance.

State Roads are owned and generally maintained by the Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT). These include major travel corridors such as Route 2, Route 8, and Route 201A. The State is responsible for all paving, striping, signage, and plowing on these roads. There are some State roads, however, that are classified as *State-Aid* Roads; the Town will partially support maintenance on

State roads. Residents who have concerns about any State road, such as potholes, drainage issues, or signage, should contact MDOT directly through their online maintenance reporting form or by calling the regional office in Wilton (562-4228). State Roads in Norridgewock include Route 2 (Mercer Road and Skowhegan Road), Route 201-A (Bridge Street and Madison Road), Route 139 (Waterville Road).

So, about these State Aid Roads... State-Aid Roads in Maine are public roads that are jointly maintained through a partnership between the Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT) and the town in which they are located. These roads are typically secondary routes that connect local roads to major state highways, serving both regional and local traffic. While ownership of the roadway generally remains with the municipality, MDOT provides financial assistance or technical support for construction, paving, or reconstruction projects. The Town usually helps with plowing these routes. This shared approach allows smaller communities to maintain important connector roads without bearing the full cost burden, ensuring that travel routes remain safe, accessible, and consistent with state highway standards. State-Aid Roads in town include Smithfield Road and River Road.

Town Roads are maintained by the Town of Norridgewock, through its Public Works Department. The Town is responsible for year-round maintenance, including paving, grading, ditching, culvert upkeep, and snow removal. Examples of Town roads include Ward Hill Road, Upper Main Street, Bombazee Road, and Sandy River Street. Funding for Town road work comes from local property taxes.

Private Roads are not maintained by the Town or the State. Instead, property owners who use these roads are responsible for all maintenance, including snow plowing, gravel replacement, and culvert cleaning. In many cases, a neighborhood road association or group of residents shares the cost and responsibility for keeping the road passable. There are dozens of private roads in Norridgewock, but some of the most prevalent, in terms of maintenance concerns heard by the Town Office are Hatto Farm Road, Park Street, and Tempesta Way. Residents and property owners on these private roads should cooperate to get work done on their road.

If you live or own property on State or State-Aid Roads, you'll want to ensure that you're compliant with DOT's requirements for entrances and driveways, mailbox maintenance, etc. Before creating or altering a driveway or road entrance, property owners must obtain a Driveway/Entrance Permit. For entrances onto State roads, MDOT issues the permit. For Town roads, the Town Office reviews and approves applications to ensure proper drainage, sight distance, and safety. Installing or altering a culvert without approval can cause drainage problems and may violate local or state regulations.

Reporting a Problem. If you notice a washout, pothole, fallen tree, or other road hazard on a Town-maintained road, contact the Norridgewock Town Office at (207) 634-2252 or the Public Works Garage at (207) 634-2253. Issues on State roads should be reported directly to the Maine Department of Transportation. For private roads, residents should work with neighbors or the road association to address concerns.

Online Reporting. The State offers an online form to report issues, maintenance requests, and other inquiries. For those requests visit, <https://www.maine.gov/dot/about/regions/western-region-3>. The Town also provides an online form that residents can use to submit concerns at www.norridgewock.gov/concern. One quick note: You can also use the Town's form to submit building violations, sidewalk issues, or any other concern you may have that is Town-related. ♦
