Public Art Mural Revealed in Town Square

Late resident Alice Emery envisioned a mural situated downtown on the property we now know as Emery Town Square, on Main Street across from Six Penny Jug. Her vision became a reality through the work of John and Janice Malek, partnering with the TIF Advisory Committee and local artist Cary Wendell. With funding from the TIF Committee, Wendell went to work designing the postcard-style mural, which came together as a remarkably cohesive piece of public art.

The mural boasts historical and modern aspects while integrating the public feedback for places Norridgewockians prioritized. There are iconic locations like the bridge/river crossing, while less recognizable attractions like the Maine Antique Tractor Club are also incorporated. The mural shows the changing uses of the river through time and its importance in commerce, transportation, and recreation. If you haven't stopped by to see it, you should! With its prominent location, the mural will surely become an attraction of its own. Special thanks to the Bailey Family of Dunkin for providing refreshments at the October unveiling event, which was well-attended. Town Awards Contract for Docks, Swim Area at Oosoola Park for Spring 2024

For quite some time, townspeople have expressed great interest in seeing a swimming area developed near Oosoola Park, as another step in enhancing our community's connection to the river. Over the course of the last two years, the project was funded, but planning and execution stalled. Earlier this year, the Select Board accepted a preliminary design for the layout (concept sketch below) and issued a request for proposals.

The project was funded for up to \$75,000, which will come from the TIF fund. Proposals were received from several area companies that provided their recommended materials for the ultimate layout. Including the first year's installation, proposals ranged from \$33,164 to \$154,588. The lowest price was provided by Maine-ly Docks of Oakland, which included a ten percent civic discount. They were granted the contract.

The new dock system will be accessible through Oosoola Park. While the initial proposal sought rip-rap installation on the bank near the gazebo, plans now currently call only for an aluminum staircase down the bank to the docks, and the area around will remain vegetated.

This investment will enhance activities on the river but will also create additional opportunities for healthier living. The system will also support a safer boat launch area, as swimmers will no longer be allowed in the launching vicinity. Expect the swim docks to be installed in June 2024.

COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER KAYAK RENTAL OPTIONS • At a recent meeting, the TIF Advisory Committee held an initial discussion about a proposed vendor to offer kayak rentals at Oosoola Park (and maybe paddle boards, too). A third party would manage the kayak rentals, and users would secure and pay for them through an app. The locked storage cages would offer kayaks and life vests, that would be unlocked using solar and cellular technology. The nearest rental program like this is offered in Auburn; it would be the first of its kind in this area. The committee will discuss the proposal at their next meeting on November 28. If you have comments or suggestions on this proposal or other economic development-related ideas, please reach out to the Town Manager or a member of the TIF Advisory Committee.

Fire Department Receives \$195,137 Grant

Through three rounds of grant applications to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Norridgewock Fire has continued to revise its application to seek funding support for the purchase of a new self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) system. The Department's equipment was aging out, and all the tanks were due to expire in the coming year. In late August, FEMA announced the award of \$195,137 to purchase the new system, which then requires a 5% local match (\$10,270, which will come from the Department's Equipment Reserve Account).

Some of the old SCBA equipment is not subject to an expiration date and/or is incompatible with the new equipment; this equipment will be sent to benefit the Smithfield Fire Department. Our last major SCBA purchase was in 1983 and was funded wholly by Consolidated Waste Services (now Waste Management).

Congratulations to Former Chiefs David Savage and David Jones, Interim Chief Todd Pineo, and the entire membership of the NFD for their hard work and adaptability to secure this funding and spare our local tax base.

Exciting things have been happening at the Norridgewock Public Library lately. We have had many community programs recently and have more to announce.

Our Storytime program started back up in September. Every first and third Thursday, we gather to read a story, have an activity, and make a craft or snack. Suggested ages are two years old through Preschool, but younger and older children may attend. Town Transitions to Norridgewock.gov Domain

The townofnorridgewock.com domain is no more; we've migrated our website and email addresses to the more secure and trusted .gov domain. You'll be redirected to our new site if you visit the old one, but you can log on directly to <u>www.norridgewock.gov</u> for all of your town-related resources. *Why did we change*? The U.S. Department of Homeland Security advised eligible governmental units that the shift signals trust and credibility while adding advanced layers of security for data. A variety of Federal agencies also help monitor a .gov domain for issues in the namespace.

Most towns and cities are required to have something in the domain that indicates the state, like waterville-me.gov or augustamaine.gov. Norridgewock is unique in that it is the only Norridgewock in the United States-- so after requesting an exception, the Town was granted the simpler and shorter <u>www.norridgewock.gov</u>.
