NFD Chief Jones Recognized for 50 Years

Town, Fire Department present commemorative silver axe

At this year's annual town meeting, Norridgewock Fire Chief David Jones was recognized for 50 years of service to the Department. Chief began back in 1972 as firefighter and has remained in service to the NFD since. In 1976, he was promoted to Fire Chief, replacing Winton "Wint" Keene.

Among the speakers recognizing Jones were Ellie Espling from the Office of United States Senator Susan Collins, State Senator Brad Farrin, State Representative Jack Ducharme,, and Deputy Fire Chief Todd Pineo. A congratulatory letter was read on behalf of United States Representative Jared Golden. Many commemorative gifts were received, including a Congressional coin, an American flag flown over the United States Capitol, State and American flags flown over the State House in Augusta, as well as a commemorative silver axe and mount from the Town and Fire Department.

It is a unique person, with a special family, that is willing to give unconditionally." In his thanks, Chief Jones announced his intention to retire from the fire service on October 5, 2022.



Select Board Orders Special Election to Fill Vacancy Left by Frederick

Former Select Board Member Ron Frederick Respectfully Declines Election by Write-In

At their March 16 meeting, the Select Board voted unanimously to order a special election to fill the vacancy that was left when long-time Select Board Member, Ron Frederick, declined to be seated after earning his seat by write-in. Garnering a write-in vote from nearly one in four voters, the 17-year Board veteran came about his decision after much deliberation.

In accordance with State Law (30-A M.R.S.A. §2602), the Select Board could either leave the seat empty and operate with a board of four members, or send the seat back to voters. The election to fill this seat will be held on June 14, in conjunction with the school referendum and any ballot measures or primaries required by the State of Maine.



Anyone wishing to appear on the ballot to fill this vacant seat must complete nomination papers, collecting a minimum of 25 signatures of qualified Norridgewock voters. Completed nomination papers must be submitted no later than close of business on Friday, April 29. Absentee ballots may be requested at any time, but they won't be available until approximately May 13.



Town Meeting Enacts Solar Moratorium

Voters enacted a commercial solar facility moratorium at town meeting, which pauses any relevant applications from being considered for 180 days, while officials review current regulations and consider the possibility of developing an ordinance. Initiated by the Planning Board, the moratorium was passed with overwhelming support from those present.

The Planning Board will begin its work of reviewing regulations at its meeting on April 14 and will continue until the process is finished. Should officials need additional time, the Select Board may approve an additional 180 day extension. Current project permits will not be impacted by this moratorium. Projects already permitted are located on River Road, Upper Main Street/Winding Hill Road, and Martin Stream Road. 

Waste Management's expansion finalized

Host community fees increase by 30 percent

Waste Management Disposal Services of Maine (WMDSM) has been active in the permitting process for the proposed Phase 14 expansion at their Crossroads Landfill in Norridgewock. As a part of that expansion, WMDSM was required to renegotiate the fees paid to Norridgewock, as host community. There were a series of triggers to increase the rate, one being the receipt of final, non-appealable permits. In late February 2022, that process finally concluded, following an appeal by the Conservation Law Foundation. As of March 1, the rate per ton, paid to the Town on waste brought in and landfilled, increased by 30 percent, to \$3.25.

The next increase, in accordance with the Host Community Agreement is when disposal begins in Phase 14, which is tentatively expected in 2023-2024. The rate will then increase to \$3.80 per ton. Thereafter, the rate will increase at 3 percent or CPI, whichever is greater. For some historical perspective, the chart below shows the annual revenues received by the Town from Waste Management. Since 2010, the Town has received \$6,174,682.72 in host fees. ◆
